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Dear Members and Friends of MPC,

Over the last month, we have had the privilege of having either youth or children lead worship. I am fully aware that some don't like that. The hymns, the sermon, the liturgy, and the vibe are all different. The sanctity of worship, some would say, is compromised. I beg to differ. While the vibe may be different, if by "sanctity" we mean "holy", then I can't think of anything much more holy than witnessing and giving thanks for how God has worked through our young people. Given all the other "activities" the world offers these days, it gives me great hope to see young lives transformed through activities offered here. And, I have never in my life heard a preacher have the courage to talk about his or her own battle with mental illness from the pulpit. That's powerful stuff.

I also learned something in our recent Children's Sunday about Lent. It's always a challenge as a pastor to discern and communicate the essence of a particular season. The children nailed it. When asked about what gave them joy, they mentioned things like cats, family, their siblings, music, being together, and helping others. It seems like they would have mentioned an Xbox or some other wildly popular video game. But they liked the simple things. Margaret Renkl wrote an editorial in last Sunday's *New York Times*, about that very thing.

"Instead of giving something up for Lent," she writes, "I'm going to make a heartfelt offering. In times like these, it makes more sense to seek out daily causes for praise than daily reminders of lack. So here is my resolution: to find as many ordinary miracles as a waterlogged winter can put forth, as many resurrections as an eerily early springtime can allow. These beautiful things are bursting forth in the darkest places, in the smallest nooks and deepest cracks of the hidden world, and I am going to keep looking every single day until I find one."

Trevor Davis



How to Make Time in the Day for Lent

The fast pace of your life may seem to leave little time and energy for the traditional Lenten practices. But you can weave moments of spiritual awareness and service into even the busiest of schedules. The trick is to see Lenten practice as part of, rather than in addition to, each activity of your ordinary hectic day.

The three foundational practices of Lent are prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Here's how to think about them in a new way:

Praying Daily

If you make a habit of saying a little prayer whenever someone irritates you, cuts you off in traffic, or makes life difficult; when someone does you a favor, you experience great and friendly service, or when something joyful happens to you—you will soon find yourself praying your way through the day. Try this simple practice and you will be observing the call for greater prayer during the Lenten season. You will also find that this habit makes your life flow smoother, yourself more centered, and your spirit more aware of God's presence.

A Different Type of Fasting

There are many ways to fast. Why not fast from criticism, gossip, judging others, or passing on rumors? Why not abstain from unwarranted fear and anxiety? You can also tell that inner voice inside your head that criticizes you to abstain from eroding your ability to be the confident, blessed person God calls you to be. These are beautiful ways to observe the Lenten call to fasting and abstinence.

Give of Yourself

Daily life also offers countless opportunities to give of yourself to others (alms), and most don't involve dipping into your wallet. Give encouragement to the doubting, give a word of praise to the insecure, show kindness to someone who could use a friend, and offer a word of thanks to those whose service of others often goes unappreciated. Give the gift of your attention to someone who simply wants to be noticed. Tell your children stories about people whose values you admire when you gather at mealtime. Don't be stingy with your smiles—give them freely to everyone you meet. And most important, give your love to those close to you. Hug them, hold them, and tell them what they mean to you. In this way you open your heart to God and others.

So no matter how busy your are in life, with some greater awareness and new perspectives you can consciously pray, fast, and give of yourself this Lent—and you will be ready to celebrate when a joyful dawn breaks upon you Easter morning.

GROW IN FAITH

Digging Deeper by Pastor Luke

Have you ever wondered why most of the prosperity of the Charlotte region is clustered in one area? If you put a clock over Charlotte, the prosperity would be from 5:00 to 7:00. Matthews is at the bottom of the 5:00. Pineville is at the bottom of the 7:00. Ballantyne is due directly south at the 6:00. South Park, Myers Park, Dilworth, and Elizabeth are all in that wedge, which is made up mostly of affluent white people. There are notable exceptions, but the rest of Charlotte is mostly poor and brown. Hence the saying, Charlotte is a wedge of prosperity in a crescent of poverty. Why is that?

Well, as it turns out, it was planned that way. Local historian Tom Hanchett points out that Charlotte was surprisingly integrated during the twenty years after the Civil War. He actually mapped it out once and showed white families living next door to former slaves. Charlotte was remarkable in that way. But an economic recession happened around 1890. Partly as a response to that, the North Carolina Democratic Party's White Supremacy Campaign started. That particular movement, whose leaders are enshrined in our university buildings and roads, convinced working class whites to break their alliances with black voters. North Carolina codified this new era of discrimination with an amended constitution, with legal discrimination. By 1911, the city had sorted itself out by color, with deeds on new houses specifying that only whites could live there. Confederate monuments exploded during this period.

Additionally, as a response to the Great Depression of the 1930s, banks coded certain parts of the city as green, which were considered good investments, and certain parts as red, which were too risky. The black parts of town, of course, were in the red zone, otherwise known as "undesirable social or economic groups." This system was known as redlining.

Despite those policies, a few black neighborhoods flourished, mainly 2nd Ward and Brooklyn. The city bought those neighborhoods using eminent domain for "urban renewal". Schools, churches, businesses, community centers were all destroyed. Matthews was not immune to any of this. The mostly black Crestdale community in Matthews didn't get city water or utilities until the early 1980s.

Wealth redistribution is a hot topic today. The truth is, though, that wealth has been unfairly redistributed from black to white families for centuries in this country, all of which has resulted in this wedge of prosperity in a vast crescent of poverty. Today's Christians must speak to this and somehow seek reconciliation and amends.


