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Spring is in the air, friends, in more ways than one. Trees are in full bloom, the Easter season is upon us, and the days are getting warmer and longer. If you have had the blues lately, things are about to get better. We are also slowly but surely coming out of the winter of Covid. Things are opening back up and people are coming back to their normal routines of life, community, and church.

The question has been posed to me many times of what we have learned in this Covid season. I have a hard time with that question for reasons that I will address later. One thing I have learned and heard said countless times is that the church is not a building. During Covid, most of you did not even see the church for two years. Yet, the church still met. The church still worshipped, served, buried its dead, cared for one another, and gathered (albeit remotely). The church was still the church even without the buildings. Jim Dygert, our custodian, did not empty the trash in the kitchen for at least a year. He never had to. Yet... the church was still the church. That is an amazing thing if you think about it.

The other thing I learned, though, is that physical presence is important. God came to us in the physical flesh. Being together is essential. The church may not be a building, but the church most definitely is people who meet together. No meeting, no church. Preaching to a camera was never my thing. Greeting a camera in

Jesus' name on Sunday morning never took the place of a real person. Virtual meeting is better than nothing, but it never takes the place of being together physically.

I would say that those are the two biggest things that I learned during Covid. I learned other things, as well, some big and some small. The two biggest, though, are that the church is not a building, but the church is necessarily a meeting. That may seem contradictory, and I guess like many things, we have to hold two seemingly contradictory things together as true at the same time.

All of which reveals why the question of what I have learned about the church during Covid has been so hard to answer. After all, what will the church be after Covid? How will we have changed? I do not know the answer to that yet, but I can say from my experience that we cannot take this journey of following Jesus alone. That journey is necessarily something that we take together. But the whole concept of massive amounts of programs, and volunteer hours, and bricks and mortar... I just do not know. Things have changed in the church in ways that we will be discerning for years.

One more thing about Covid that I learned is that God will be faithful. This is God's Church. We are God's people whom God has gathered and whom God will sustain. God has given us good work to do at Matthews Presbyterian Church. God has given us countless resources to do that work. So let us all get back home to church. Springtime is here. We are Easter people. We are blessed to call Matthews Presbyterian home.

Worship Volunteer Opportunities




Digging Deeper by Pastor Luke

The study that we have had on Wednesday night about hymns has been illuminating and encouraging. The hymns that we know and love were often written during tragic circumstances. Cleland Boyd McAfee wrote *Near to the Heart of God* after the death of his two infant nieces. Fanny Crosby wrote *Jesus, Keep Me Near the Cross* after she was stricken with blindness. We do not know who wrote *What Wondrous Love Is This,* but we do know that it came from somewhere in Appalachia, which was Scots-Irish, which at times was a tragic existence.

Hymns were ALL new at one time and therefore controversial. Isaac Watts is the most prolific hymn writer in the Protestant Church, but the theological and musical hallmarks that we know as *When I Survey the Wondrous Cross, Ah Holy Jesus, Joy to the World, From All that Dwell Below the Skies...*were all summarily dismissed at the time as "Watts' Flights of Fancy" or "Watts' Whims." Only long after these hymns were first introduced did the church appreciate their beauty and power.

Finally, not only were those hymns originally dismissed as fanciful and whimsical, but also heretical in that they were taking secular and profane language and music and putting them in holy places like sanctuaries. At the time, it would be like reading a poem that the pastor had written instead of Scripture. What we value as having formed so many people in the way of Christ was painfully controversial at the time it was written. Yet God worked through the controversy, the pain, and the bewilderment to do God's good work.

The same is true today. God is working among God's saints in ways that God's saints do not see at the time. Through the controversies, decline, mundaneness, pain, and tragedy of our lives together, God is working nonetheless in ways big and small, through people big and small, to do God's good work of redeeming the world that God has loved.
