The Pastor's Page

Dear Members and Friends of MPC,

I tuned in to NPR on my way to work this morning, like I always do, but learned that it was the beginning of their fall pledge campaign... so I immediately tuned out. For whatever reason, those "pledge campaigns" repulse me. The only thing that drives me crazier than people asking for my money is when I have to ask for theirs.

So here I sit during our own "pledge campaign" asking you for cash. We've got to get our 2020 budget together, so I need to ask you for cash. Please give your money to the Lord, we preachers say. The address is 207 W. John Street. And...please give generously, because the Lord loves a generous giver (and so do I).

Stewardship is a great deal more than just money, but stewardship includes money and nothing makes us more uncomfortable than that. Most of us don't mind being asked to give time, talents, and gifts, just so long as those gifts don't entail money. But they do entail money.

But what if our giving itself is a gift? The theme for this year's campaign is "and he thanked Him." It's about the one leper out of ten whom Jesus healed who remembered to give thanks. My sense of that story is that giving thanks itself was part of the healing. The other nine lepers forgot that. They were healed of the leprosy, but were they healed of their brokenness? The story isn't clear on that.

What is clear though is that we have a role to play in our own healing. God has saved us in Jesus Christ and has gathered us to this community as part of that salvation. God has given us hope, meaning, and purpose. God has made us a new creation. Yet we are not just passive recipients in that creation. We have a role to play. We can live it, enjoy it, and share it. When we do that, that healing becomes more real for us.

# What is Stewardship?

We often use the word 'stewardship,' in regards to money. While stewardship does include our use of money, the word is more general. In the dictionary, stewardship is defined as: "the position and duties of a steward, a person who acts as the surrogate of another or others, especially by managing property, financial affairs, an estate...the responsible overseeing and protecting of something considered worth caring for and preserving."

So, if I am a steward, I am managing or overseeing something that doesn't belong to me. I'm not the owner, but I have the responsibility to make sure it's being handled properly. If I'm the steward of a farm, I don't own the animals, equipment, or land, but I take care of it as if I am the owner. If I'm the steward of someone's money, I decide how the money is spent.

Our Lord owns everything. Jesus calls Christians to be stewards of what is His, and we are responsible for how we manage it. In the beginning, God created everything and put Adam in the garden to "work it and keep it." There is much in our lives the Lord calls us to steward. With that said, this article will focus specifically on our stewardship of time and money.

#### **Stewards of Time**

It doesn't matter how much money you have, where you are from, what color you are, or what your job is, we all have the same amount of time. You can't buy or borrow more time from others, there's absolutely nothing you can do to change how much time you have in a day.

So, if we've been given a specific amount of time, then we must be intentional and wise with how we use the time God gives us. Just like everything else in our life, we will give an account for how we spend our time (Romans 14:12). In Ephesians 4:15-16 we are instructed: "Therefore be careful how you walk, not as unwise men, but as wise, making the most of your time, because the days are evil."

Knowing that our time on earth is a vapor (James 4:14), let us consider how we spend our days and be careful not to waste time. Using our time wisely does not necessarily mean turning into a busybody, as rest and enjoyment are gifts from the Lord. However, let us be careful that we are not taking a blessing from the Lord and turning it into a meaningless time-waster.

#### **Stewards of Money**


Jesus says something stunning in Matthew 6:21: "For where your treasure is, there you heart will be also." It might seem like our use of money has little bearing on our spiritual life, but Jesus teaches that the way we spend our money is actually a window into our heart. We can look at our spending and see what we truly value.

In the book, *Spiritual Disciplines in the Christian Life*, by Dr. Donald Whitney, Whitney argues the same point: "But as much as anything else, the reason use of money and the things it buys is one of the best indicators of spiritual maturity and Godliness is that we exchange such a great part of our lives for it. Because we invest most of our days working in exchange for money, there is a very real sense in which our money represents us. Therefore, how we use it expresses who we are, what our priorities are, and what's in our hearts."

We can say we love God and His church, but at the end of the day, the way we spend our money will show us what we truly value.

All of our time and money belong to the Lord. We shouldn't think that God simply wants a small portion of our time on Sunday or a small percentage of our money. Rather, we are to prayerfully consider how we spend each minute and every dollar that the Lord entrusts to us. May we be good stewards of our time and money for the glory of God!

# **CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE**

In August 2016, Matthews Presbyterian Church kicked off a huge endeavor – a Capital Campaign. The objective of the campaign was to raise funds to reduce the mortgage debt and complete various capital improvement projects on church buildings and property. A total of \$531,859 was pledged to the Capital Campaign.

Through August 31, 2019, \$449,365.82 or 84% of the total amount pledged has been received. Thank you to everyone who has committed their time and financial resources to help the church reach this level of giving.

Marjie Moore works alongside Jack at the School and works with the young girls in the community. She started Sunlight Ministries, an organization that the children of the community help to run. Every time we come, they put on a performance in the gym and we go in and watch their dance. This year, that performance was accompanied by a memorial service for Bryan Gustus. For those who don't know Bryan, he was the sweetest, smartest guy you would ever meet. He loved the West Virginia Mountaineers, he loved Gary, WV, and he loved everyone he met. About a year ago, Bryan passed away unexpectedly. This summer wasn't the same without him. Bryan was a huge part of our trip and he was dearly missed this summer. However, our trip was still successful and we made a positive impact on the community, which is our ultimate goal!!

On behalf of the church, we thank you for always supporting our mission trips and helping to let us keep going back year after year. Not only are our trips fun, but impactful on the communities we help.

# **Digging Deeper**

It's hard to read the Bible and not come away with an idea that we're supposed to welcome strangers and aliens. "You shall love the stranger," God tells us in Deuteronomy 10:19, "for you were strangers in the land of Egypt." We read verses like that dozens of times in both the Old and New Testament. The Israelites leaving Egypt and wandering around for forty years were nothing if they weren't a caravan of refugees. So when Israel found a home in Canaan, how could they not show kindness to strangers there?

Mary & Joseph fled Palestine with their infant baby, named Jesus, to escape religious and political persecution. Ironically enough, they had to go back to Egypt. What were they if they weren't refugees? Part of our collective story as a people of faith is being a refugee. We know what it's like to pack everything we own, put it on our backs, and flee in terror. That's part of our collective story as the people of God.

It's also part of our collective story as Presbyterians. There is a reason, after all, that we are no longer in Scotland. We were persecuted there, so like Mary & Joseph before us and like Moses before them, we fled. Most us left Ulster from Scotland to land in Ireland, only to be driven out there to Philadelphia, where we moved west to Pittsburgh and then south to the Carolinas.

How dare, then, that we, who have been refugees no fewer than four times in our collective history and have found a home nonetheless, not be gracious to refugees today? I understand the need for laws and rules and maybe even physical barriers in some places (walls), but the world has more refugees in it now than at any time since the end of World War II. Whatever the Christian response is, the emphasis must necessarily be grace and mercy. If it's not, then whatever it is, it's not Christian.

"Refugees are mothers, fathers, sisters, brothers, children, with the same hopes and ambitions as us—except that a twist of fate has bound their lives to a global refugee crisis on an unprecedented scale."


## **New Midweek Bible Study for Young Mothers**

You will learn simple ways to be intentional about rest, ideas for tuning out distractions and tuning in God, and even how meals and other times with friends and family can be Sabbath experiences.

Ultimately, this book is an invitation to those who long for rest but don't know how to make it a reality. Sabbath is a gift from God to be embraced, not a spiritual hoop to jump through.
