Both options will require a capital campaign. Renovating the chapel will obviously require more funding. As such, we are currently interviewing architects to render drawings of what a renovated chapel would entail and to estimate how much it would cost. Additionally, we will be conducting a feasibility study in the coming months to determine how much funding a capital campaign could raise and whether that funding could match estimated costs.

I wish that I could say that the path to this decision is a clear one, but it is not. Exactly how we conduct a feasibility study, for example, or which architect that we use and, more importantly, how we determine the use for a renovated chapel building... none of that is clearly spelled out anywhere. Like all important decisions, the path to discernment is not self-evident. However, we are on that path. We are meeting, we are talking to the experts, we are talking to you... and we are praying.

Finally, to that end, we are conducting a prayer service of discernment on the chapel building on Wednesday evening, June 26th at 6:30 pm. I hope to see you all there. I also hope that you get some badly needed rest and relaxation this summer. I need that in a bad way myself. This is going to be a great summer. Mission trips, vacation Bible schools, weekly worship, rest and relaxation all abound... And so do decisions, good ones. We will know more at summer's end than we know now. That's a good thing and I look forward to discerning with you what that is.

Digging Deeper

On Saturday morning, October 7, the Palestinian group that governs the Gaza Strip, Hamas, broke its borders and viciously attacked Israel, killing over 1200 Jews, thus marking the worst massacre of Jews since the Holocaust. The victims were almost all non-combatants and included numerous children. Since that attack, the state of Israel has conducted a bombing operation on the Gaza Strip that has resulted the deaths of around 35,000 Palestinian civilians, most of whom were also non-combatants that include numerous children.

Even a cursory reading of the Bible, both Old and New Testaments, suggests that Jews have a special relationship with Christians. That same cursory reading, however, suggests that Christians are also called to love everyone, including Palestinians, many of whom, after all, are themselves Christian.

Exactly what the Gaza Strip is, however, and how it relates to the West Bank, and exactly how Palestinians got cordoned off to both and also ended up as voting citizens of Israel, and exactly how the current state of Israel was established and how the United States has aided that state... those are issues that many Christians know little about but want and need desperately to learn.

Speaking on such issues is fraught with danger. That history is complicated and that conflict is so old and deep that no class, or series of classes, can possibly cover it all. In addition, each section of each chapter consists of two very legitimate perspectives and speaking on any perspective risks being unfair to the other. Objective truth in this conflict is very, very difficult to determine.

However, American Christians have played a unique role in that conflict and therefore have a significant stake in it. While speaking about it is inherently risky, not speaking about it is irresponsible. To that end, in addition to other conversations that this church is having this summer, we will have this one, as well.

The pastor is hosting four meetings on this topic on the following dates: June 19, July 10, August 14, and September 11, all of which are Wednesdays and start at 6:30 PM. Each conversation will also be covered via live-stream. The first conversation will cover a brief history of the conflict, the second will try to present the conflict from a Jewish perspective, the third from a Palestinian perspective, and the fourth from a Christian perspective. We will be anything but experts on Israel/Palestine after this is over, but we can and will know more, with the hope that we can be part of a peaceful solution to this land that God and God's people have so loved.
